Title: Using Word 2007 to Create a Table of Medical Terms

Materials

Handout of instructions on how to create a computerized table of medical terms.

Computer with Microsoft 2007

Learner Prior Knowledge

The student should have simple knowledge of how to use a Microsoft computer.

Activities

<u>Step 1</u> Model the use of a prefix added to a root or stem to derive new words. State the meaning of the new words. Examples: hypoglycemic and hyperglycemic

<u>Step 2</u> Model how to turn on computers and get a Word document. Allow advanced computer students to help others

Step 3 Illustrate how to use the Table menu bar to draw the table.

Again, walk around room and help all students. Stress that students must tab from column to column or row to row.

<u>Step 4</u> Hand out written directions to complete the table, which includes the prefixes and roots to create medical terms.

<u>Step 5</u> Have students access the Internet to look up meanings, if necessary.

Assessment/Evidence

80% correct demonstrates mastery

Put students completed worksheets in portfolio to demonstrate mastery of benchmarks.

Adaptations for Beginning Students

Teacher checks for comprehension and gives one-on-one instruction on the missed areas

Adaptations for Advanced Students

Add five more prefixes and roots to tables.

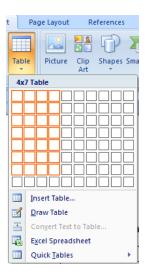
Teacher Reflection/Lesson Evaluation

CREATING A TABLE OF MEDICAL PREFIXES, ROOTS, AND MEANINGS

<u>Directions</u>: 1. Get a Word document. To make the table, pull down the Insert menu and click on Table. Highlight four columns and seven rows as shown at right. 2. Type all of the material shown in the table. <u>TAB to go from row to row and column to column</u>. To insert or delete a row or column, right click your mouse and choose delete or add a row or column. 3. The last four new words and their meanings are not given. You are to form and type the words and their meanings.

READ ONLY

A prefix is an affix placed in front of the root or stem word.

A root word is the base or stem. When a prefix or suffix is added to a root, it changes the meaning of the word to which it is added.

Example: Every prefix has its own meaning. The root word "purpose" means "an aim or a goal one wishes to achieve." The prefix "multi" means "many." The new word "multipurpose" means "designed or used for many purposes."
