Learner Prior Knowledge

Students should understand that there are different purposes for reading.

Activities

<u>Step 1</u> If using the handout from the justriddlesandmore site, inform students they will have a 5-minute time limit to complete the handout. They should read carefully all parts of the handout before doing anything.

<u>Step 2</u> Students who did not read through the whole handout first will be writing answers on their papers. Only the students who "followed the directions" will have only one word written on their handouts.

<u>Step 3</u> If using the lesson from the educationworld site, inform students that you will state each instruction, pause, and repeat the instruction only once. They must listen carefully.

<u>Step 4</u> Check the finished product to determine if directions were followed exactly.

<u>Step 5</u> After the handouts are checked, students will write a paragraph reflecting on the assignment: Was I successful? Did I learn anything from the assignment? How does this relate to my life, studies, or job?

Assessment/Evidence

Completed How Well Can You Follow Directions? handout or project

A written paragraph about the student's reflection on the assignment and how it relates to him or her.

Adaptations for Beginning Students

Use easier words on handout.

Adaptations for Advanced Students

No adaptation. Advanced students should enjoy the lesson as much as the rest of the class.
