Bleich's Heuristic for Responding to Reading

Purpose:

To provide a framework for reflection about text. Students are asked to think about their responses to text two ways—affectively and associatively.

Materials:

Literary text works best, but certain nonfiction selections (e.g., current events, issues likely to cause emotional reaction) will also be good choices.

Procedure:

Students respond to these three questions [list from current sheet] in writing, after which discussion may (or may not) follow. Teachers may want to encourage students to make notes about their responses rather than developing full essays.
